- 4. https://www.vote4kids.ca/ Teachers are encouraged, strongly, to make best efforts to ensure that education and education funding is an issue in the upcoming election. The ATA has produced "sardine can" pull-tab flyers to distribute during the election. The hope is that candidates of every party receive enough of these flyers - and questions and concerns about education - that every candidate and every party leader are compelled to draw one conclusion: education is too important to voters and education funding is too well-supported to be monkeyed with. Teachers should be aware that such election advocacy would be occurring from a position of strength; polling support is strong:
 - a. 59% of Albertans feel that class sizes are too big
 - b. 78% of Albertans are at least somewhat supportive of increasing funding to decrease class sizes
 - c. 73% of Albertans say that education is important when deciding how to vote
 - d. 84% of Albertans say that government education funding will the education issue most likely to affect their vote
- 5. There is an attempt underway to create a Catholic specialist council. Currently Catholic issues are addressed via the Religious and Moral Education council, which has a significant representation of Catholic teachers. FYI: approximately \(\frac{1}{3} \) of the Association's teachers are Catholic/work in Catholic schools.

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Professional Development

- 2. Some of our students come to us having experienced trauma. This can manifest in many ways and create challenges for students and teachers. - 3. Regarding the new Leadership Quality Standards (LQS), administrators may want to get in on the upcoming LQS sessions during convention because, in the relatively near future, this option will disappear and training for Leadership Certification will become available only via post secondary institutions.  - a. Current principals will be "grandparented" into certification. They are welcome to take part in one of the 2 day certification sessions this year but are not required to do so in order to get certified: the certification will occur in any event. Some (many?) are choosing to attend but, rest assured, they'll be certified whether they attend or not.
 - b. VPs and APs, on the other hand, are the real target for the 2 day certification sessions this year. Attending one of these sessions will allow those VPs and APs to "check off a box" on their way toward certification ... assuming that all goes well in terms of their future assignments.
 - c. Aspirants for school leadership muggles, as it were can theoretically attend these 2 day sessions but will NOT be able to "check off a box" by doing so. They also may find some resistance to their attendance at these sessions because, basically, they would be attending the session for (as the kids say) "shiggles." These attendees would not even be eligible for a hero cookie, much less certification. Why not just have a nap? Or spend quality time with your family? There are a lot of better options, to my mind.
 - d. Before you ask, the circumstances outlined above were not created by the decisions of the ATA. The Association is a partner in the standards, but the Department of Education ultimately made the decision to attach certification to the LQS, and to require training (i.e. courses) for those attaining certification.

Member Services

- 1. Expect to see an advertisement for a **new MS staff officer position** in the very near future.
- 2. The Minister of Education recently announced a ban on seclusion rooms for the fall. The decision may have unintended consequences. What of other types of rooms used in schools to address student behavior and student needs: sensory, quiet, calming, time-out, etc? Also, as teachers know, the use of isolation or seclusion rooms is a symptom of a larger problem facing schools: extreme student misbehaviour and how to deal with it in a way that considers the needs and safety of all students and staff.
- 3. As our classrooms become more diverse teachers are seeing more unfamiliar names on their class lists. Knowing how to pronounce the names correctly can be a challenge, but doing so can be a crucial part of making a positive first connection with a student. Some teachers are using this resource - https://hearnames.com/pronunciations - to help meet that challenge.
- 4. OHS Workplace Health and Safety Committees continue to be a concern for many Locals. Again, Local representatives are strongly encouraged to seek Member Services advice and to proceed carefully in the interest of workplace safety. Keep in mind that these are JOINT committees and that support from the workers - i.e. the union, in this case the ATA Local - is crucial. It's the Local that speaks for the teachers; Boards should not be "going around the Local" to seek support from teachers directly.
